US funding doubled between 2015 and 2023 to reach over US \$16bn

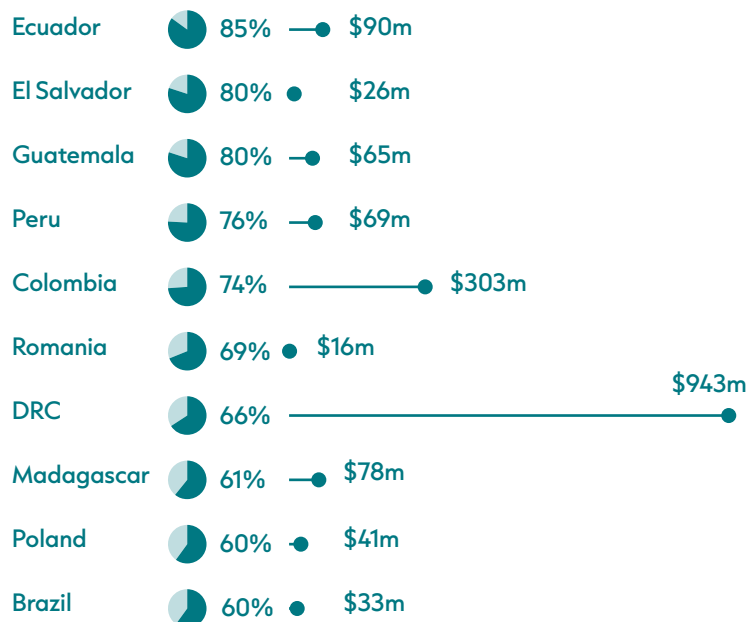
US international humanitarian assistance 2015–2024



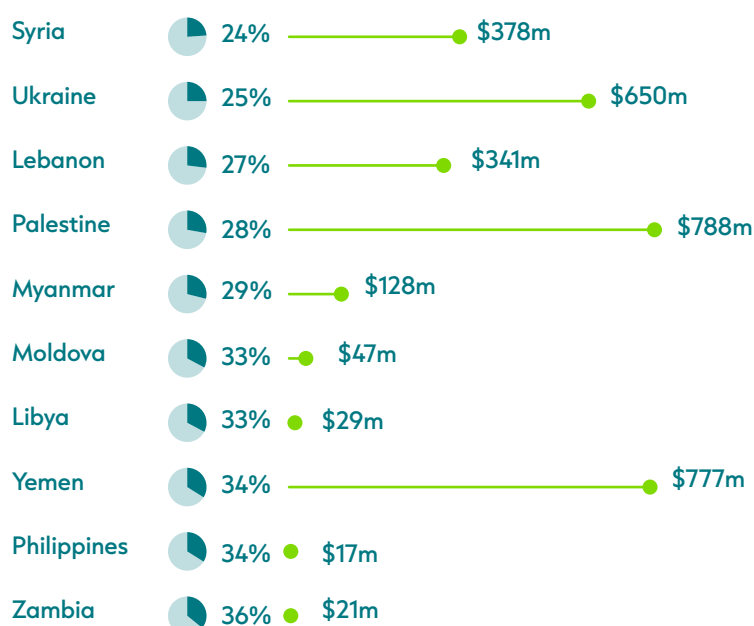
The average context with a response plan depended on the US for 50% of its funding

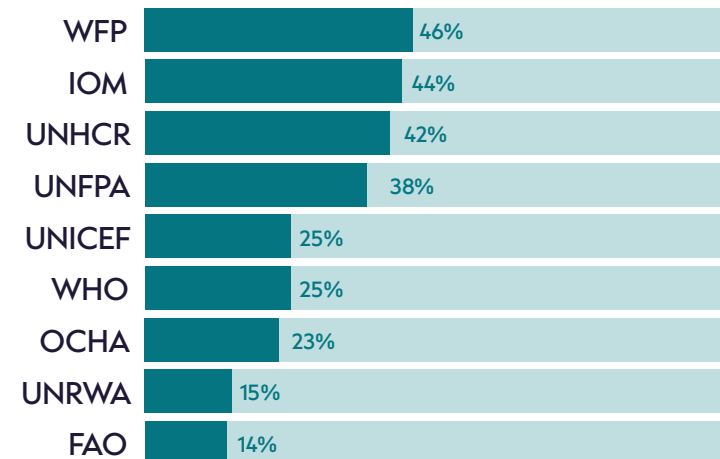

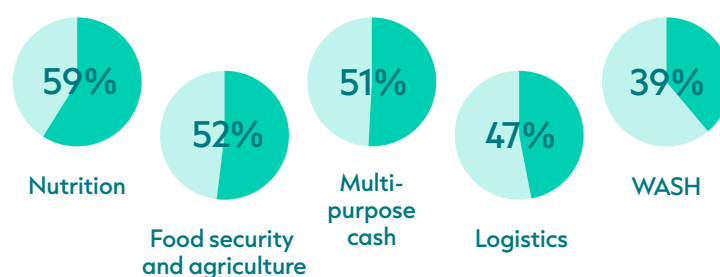

US funding as a share of its humanitarian assistance



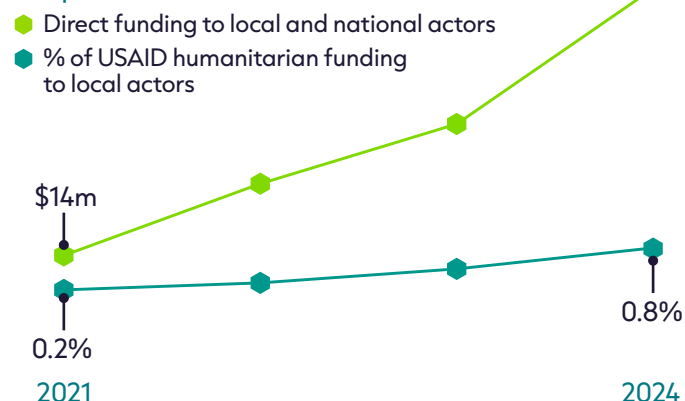
Sectoral exposure
